### Message from the President – Bernie Fontaine

Welcome everyone to a great start to the new year. We have been busier than ever understanding some of the OSHA rule changes relative to beryllium, crystalline silica, electronic recordkeeping, etc.; anticipating changes by the new Trump administration in enforcement and consultation; and changes in leadership at AIHA. NJAIHA congratulates Larry Sloan, AIHA CEO, and the appointment of Mark Ames as AIHA's new director, government relations. Among Mark's priorities will be an enhanced focus on addressing the needs of the local sections from the perspective of keeping abreast of the rapidly evolving rubric of state regulations and laws impacting industrial hygiene.

The NJAIHA Executive Committee continues to solicit help of our membership to meet our 2016-2017 goals and objectives set forth in the action plan. Some of our members are reaching out to local high schools and talking about the NJ Youth@Work Talking Safety program. This is the time of giving back to our profession. Many school administrators and faculty members see the value of lesson but they are afraid of the commitment on an annual basis. The youth health and safety message can be presented in a 45-minute classroom period and it should be delivered annually to remind students, who are seeking employment, that health and safety is important both at work (e.g., summer job, part-time work during school, and selecting a trade after graduation) and apply these concepts in everything that they do for recreation, vacation, hobbies, and other personal initiatives. NJAIHA participates in the quarterly NJ State Industrial Safety Committee (NJSISC) business meetings. In Dec 2016, a conflict of interest arose in the administration of regional dinner meetings for the annual safety awards. Since NJSISC is an extension of the State of NJ, it cannot raise revenue and the State of NJ has not appropriated funding to hold the dinner meetings. In order to continue a long-standing tradition of the NJSISC award ceremonies; the State of NJ offered several suggestions for NJSISC to either operate as a nonprofit or collaborate with all of the participatory NJ nonprofits to host the dinner meetings and award ceremonies. NJAIHA is collaborating with NJSISC to determine the best approach More information will be provided as management decisions are derived on how to resolve this matter.

The business value of industrial hygiene and safety is being recognized more in business as a tool for risk management, advancement of technology, and a driver for economic, social, and governance of the workforce, public, and environment. We seek input from the NJAIHA membership to collaborate more with our neighboring local sections. Philadelphia, Metro NY, and NJ sections of AIHA agreed to post each other dinner meeting announcements. NJASSE and MABSA are interested in sharing more information on occupational health and safety. The objective herein is to provide better collaboration and coordination of regional learning and job opportunities for the membership of each local section or chapter. ## 2017 Industrial Hygiene and Safety Review Course

Are you looking for an inexpensive way to study for the CIH and CSP exams? Do you need certification maintenance points to meet your re-certification requirements? The New Jersey Section of the American Industrial Hygiene Association (NJ-AIHA) is offering a comprehensive Industrial Hygiene Course. The course is designed to provide basic training in some critical areas of industrial hygiene and safety and will likely be beneficial for those entering the field as well as those who are just looking to sharpen their skills in certain technical areas.

In addition, many of the people who have attended the program have found it to be very helpful in preparing for the CIH and CSP examinations. Certified Industrial Hygienists have the opportunity to obtain CM points per lecture (0.167 points per contact hour). Participants are welcome to attend any or all of the lecture sessions, depending on their individual training needs. People who need certification maintenance points must sign an attendance sheet for each session.

History of Industrial Hygiene, OSH Act Review and IH Management, Epidemiology, Fire Protection, Emergency Response, Ergonomics, Risk Management – Record Keeping, Indoor Air Quality, Bio-Safety, Equipment and Facility Safety, Ionizing Radiation, Non-Ionizing Radiation, Math, Statistics & Calculator Review, Air Pollution, Toxicology, Regulatory & Legal Affairs, Physics and Basic Engineering, Air Sampling – IH Chemistry, Direct Reading Instrumentation, Industrial Noise, Mechanical Exhaust Ventilation, Ethics and Professional Conduct, Respiratory Protection and other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)


