Message from the President – Craig Doolittle

Greetings:

With natural disasters dominating the headlines recently, there are just as many advertisements and requests to help out. How best to decide where and how to help? But I think we can all agree that when AIHA itself reaches out to its members to appeal for their assistance, our local chapters can be assured that the need exists and the cause is worthy. In case you missed it, I have included the note to all AIHA members here:

Dear AIHA Member,

Over the last few weeks I've been keeping you informed about our efforts to help those affected by the recent natural disasters. Today I am calling on you directly to help the people of Puerto Rico, who will be facing infectious diseases and other hazards in the coming months.

I received an email from Professor Sergio Caporali Filho, Ph.D., CSP, CIH, the coordinator of the Industrial Hygiene Program at the University of Puerto Rico Graduate School of Public Health. The full-time faculty and volunteer graduate students from the program want to provide their communities with the knowledge to protect themselves from injury and illness during the recovery process. However, to do so they will need protective gear. So I ask all of you, if you can, to please send one or more of the items listed on our <u>Disaster Response</u> Resource Center.

Each donor will receive acknowledgment of their donation's arrival, including a general description of contents, within one week. When donated goods are delivered to communities, donors will be informed of what was donated and to whom. The program is not asking for, nor will it accept, any monetary donations.

The IH community in Puerto Rico is seeking our help, and as I said in my last letter, our individual contributions may be small, but together, we can make a difference. Will you answer the call?

Please feel free to donate directly to support this urgent cause; however, if you have any questions, please email **Professor Caporali**. Please note, there may be a delay in his response due to the challenges in internet coverage.

7:15 p.m. <u>After Dinner Session</u>: GHS Classification Shock; Scientific Approaches to Hazard Inversion, Presented by Don Ewert, Industrial Hygienist, Occupational Health Services, RJ Lee Group. Topic: This presentation offers attendees an introduction to HazCom 2012 along with a discussion of the impact which GHS rules have had on hazard classification of products containing crystalline silica. Using international GHS guidelines and 1910.1200 Appendix A, the presenter will lead participants through a review of the technical methods employed in product characterization, offer a discussion on exemptions which occur under GHS and provide descriptions of the techniques we use to reclassify or "hazard invert" those products containing Respirable Crystalline Silica (RCS).

DIRECTIONS:

Pick up Route 22 West to sign reading "Mountain Ave. – Scotch Plains". Take Mountain Ave. thru 2nd traffic light to parking lot entrance on the right (just after intersection).

Coming from New York City - Lincoln or Holland Tunnels or George Washington Bridge - take NJ Turnpike SOUTH to Newark Airport Exit #14 and follow common directions above.

Coming from Staten Island - Go over the Goethels Bridge and exit to the NJ Turnpike NORTH. Take the Turnpike to Exit #14 to Route 22 WEST and follow common directions above.

Take 287 NORTH to Somerville, Exit to Route 22 EAST to Scotch Plains. Entrance on right, after Blue Star Shopping Center and before Park Ave. overpass.

Coming from PA or Points West – Route 78 EAST to Exit #41. Follow signs to Route 22, Scotch Plains. At 3rd traffic light turn right to go over Overpass to Park Ave. Stay in right lane of overpass and at next light turn right onto Mountain Ave. Make first right turn to enter parking lot

GENERAL DIRECTIONS TO PSE&G

From North NJ/NY Area - Take N.J. Turnpike to Exit 10. Follow signs for I-287 North and take Exit 4 for Durham Avenue/South Plainfield. Go down the ramp and bear left. Go one block to light and make a right onto Hadley Road. Go past the first light. The PSE&G building is on the righthand side, which is about 200 yards past the light. Look for the PSE&G sign.

From West (PA) - Take PA Turnpike East until the end and follow onto NJ Turnpike North. Follow the same directions as North NJ/NY area

Course #1: Ethical Fitness- A Method for Resolving Complex Dilemmas* 8:30 AM - 12:00 PM

Course Instructor: Nancy Orr, CIH, CSP, FAIHA Becton Dickinson

This PDC on Ethical Fitness helps participants develop an increased awareness of the ethical issues and how they arise. Participants will learn to:

- Understand the nature of personal values and their role in guiding conduct
- Apply tools and skills to analyze ethical dilemmas
- Learn to identify and resolve potential 'conflict of interest' situations
- Make higher quality ethical decisions

Participants in this course will acquire essential skills necessary to make higher quality ethical decisions. This skill – building process begins by developing an awareness of ethical issues and how they arise. The role of personal values and their application to decision – making is then examined. Participants practice using analytical techniques to explore right vs. wrong situations as distinct from right vs. right dilemmas, where values conflict. Explore how to resolve situations where truth conflicts with loyalty; justice and mercy; set both short-term and long-term goals, and understand self-interest conflicts will apply several resolution approaches to dilemmas in search of the higher right."

*This course fulfills the ABIH ethics requirement for CIH recertification maintenance credit.

Course #2: Value Strategy to Invest and Promote Health, Safety and Environmental Interventions 8:30 AM - 12:00 PM

Course Instructor: Bernard D. Silverstein, CIH, FAIHA TVS Associates, LLC

Developing a value proposition, (e.g., the sum total of the costs and benefits of interventions), allows the Industrial Hygienist to advance employee health and safety using classical business methods. The AIHA value strategy is a unique and comprehensive process where the Industrial Hygienist aligns risk management with business objectives, promoting stakeholder values. Utilizing the Value Strategy process, promoting health and safety interventions thought business alignment, stakeholder value, and financial analysis the Industrial Hygienist will be able to compete for limited resources and advance worker health and safety. Upon course completion, the participants will be able to:

- Align key business objectives with health and safety interventions for decision making
- Identify financial and non-financial value factors used to support business decisions
 Understand the key components of financial
- Oncertainty the key components of minimum and and non-financial analysis
 Use software supporting the Value Strategy
- processes

Course # 3: NJ P.L. 2017, Chapter 69. Hazardous Drug Safety Act and USP <800> and <797> - Impact in Hospitals, Health-care, Compounding, and Manufacture 1:00 PM - 4:30 PM

Course Instructors: Martha Polovich, Ph.D., RN, AOCN Georgia Tech University Michael Berg, Ph.D. EMLab P&K

The NJ Hazardous Drug Safe Handing Act was passed in May 2017. It is designed to protect at-risk healthcare personnel who handle hazardous drugs (HDs). HDs include cytotoxic agents and reproductive hazards and other chemical and biological agents including: analgesics, antibiotics, beta-blockers, antineoplastics, and perfluorinated compounds.

This PDC will provide an overview of the adverse effects of the HD exposure, review the requirements of the Act, and list strategies that the industrial hygiene community can implement to support this endeavor. Emphasis will be placed on the containment strategies and work practices outlined by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), which are required by the Act, and the United States Pharmacopeia Convention (USP) standards for HD handling in healthcare settings and pharmaceutical compounding and manufacture.


Course # 4: Advancements in Gas Detection: The Proper Use, Care and Selection of Portable Gas Monitors 1:00 PM - 4:30 PM

Course Instructors: Bob Vigdor, and Paul Truncellito, QSSP Premier Safety & Service

Gas sensors have traditionally been limited to industrial leak detection but a new wave of miniaturization and cost reduction in the chemical gas sensor industry has emerged. Air quality is becoming a major concern, and real-time gas sensors are increasingly attracting interest. It is important to understand the type of health hazard and limitations of the instrumentation to provide an accurate risk assessment. Participants will learn to:

- Selection of the correct air monitoring instrument for the proper application
- Understand differences in sensor technology between catalytic bead, infrared, photo- and flame ionizing detectors, and electrochemical devices
- Benefits, accuracy, difference, and frequency between automatic instrument calibrations and bump testing
- Inherent problems with using gas detection equipment in industrial/environmental settings.

The course provides "hands-on" demonstration of different gas detection equipment and allows time for technologists and seasoned industrial hygienists to get a feel for these instruments. Participants will leave the course confident about their correct field application.
