2018 SCHOLARSHIPS

The New Jersey Section of the American Industrial Hygiene Association (NJAIHA) is pleased to offer scholarships for the study and promotion of industrial hygiene / environmental health and safety for the 2018-2019 school year.

Up to \$7,500 is available for award among the selected candidates.

- Scholarships are available for students who will be enrolled in the Fall of 2018 in courses leading to a degree in industrial hygiene or allied fields such as occupational/environmental health and safety.
- Recipients must reside in NJ (if attending college outside of NJ) or be enrolled in an accredited college in NJ.
- Previous recipients are eligible to apply.
- Minimum cumulative GPA is 3.0.
- Deadline for application has been extended and will is now **May 31, 2018**. The recipients will be notified in late May and are invited to attend the **June 2018** NJAIHA meeting and make a short presentation to receive their award.
- Applicants must provide the following:
 - Completed scholarship application (found on the NJAIHA website (http://www.njaiha.org/students/2018-scholarships/)
 - A statement on a single sheet of paper of why you should be the recipient of the scholarship;
 - A copy or official transcript of records with GPA; and
 - A letter of recommendation from a faculty member or course-related employer,
 but preferably the student's advisor.

Take 287 NORTH to Somerville, Exit to Route 22 EAST to Scotch Plains. Entrance on right, after Blue Star Shopping Center and before Park Ave. overpass.

Coming from PA or Points West - Route 78 EAST to Exit #41. Follow signs to Route 22, Scotch Plains. At 3rd traffic light turn right to go over Overpass to Park Ave. Stay in right lane of overpass and at next light turn right

onto Mountain Ave. Make first right turn to enter parking lot

April 6, 2018 - The Week in Review

While Members of Congress have been on a two-week recess, the States have been hard at work! Occupational licensure and certification in Louisiana and Oklahoma, and worker protections for cannabis workers in California are all among the newest developments. Congressional Work Begins in Fiscal Year 2019 Bills

Members of Congress return next week and begin holding hearings to develop the Fiscal Year 2019 funding bills. The 2019 Federal Fiscal Year begins October 1, 2018. As a reminder, late last month Congress and President Donald J. Trump approved the omnibus appropriations bill (<u>H.R.1625</u>), which provides level for funding the remaining six months of the current Fiscal Year for OSHA, NIOSH, MSHA, and others.

Keep an Eye on These: Louisiana Bills Propose Definition for Occupational Certification and Creation of Office for the Supervision of Occupational Boards

Louisiana <u>House Bill 748</u> and <u>Senate Bill 494</u> aren't threats, but they are something to watch. AIHA is also sending a letter to Louisiana State Legislators educating them on the importance and value of professional designations, such as the CIH.

Rather than create any new restrictions, these bills would create new definitions for "certification", "occupational license", and related terms. They would also create a new Office of Supervision of Occupational Boards, which, as its name suggests, would review proposed regulations related to occupational certification and licensing. Reviews would seek to identify the "least restrictive regulation necessary to protect consumers from present, significant, and empirically substantiated harms".

These bills represent yet another instance of the occupational rights wave sweeping the nation. As in other cases, health and safety protections and professional designations may actually benefit from these measures, however vigilance is warranted to guard against the potential unintended effects of policy decisions.

Cannabis Worker Protection Bill Advances in California

Cannabis businesses may be required to ensure that at least one supervisor and one employee have completed Cal/OSHA training. <u>Assembly Bill 2799</u> recently passed the Business and Professions Committee and is now in the hands of the Labor and Employment Committee, awaiting further action.

Oklahoma is about to make it easier understand occupational licensing and certification requirements <u>House Bill 2771</u> is racing through the Oklahoma State Legislature. The succinct bill would require the Oklahoma Department of Labor to develop and maintain a website that allows the public to view all the occupational licensing and certification requirements mandated by the State, providing workers and

businesses with easier access to the requirements, qualifications, and fees associated with each occupation.

Earlier this week, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed the bill, teeing it up for further action. The bill was approved by the House of Representatives in mid-March. AIHA supports this bill.
