Volunteers on local section committees can now earn 0.5 CM points per year!

CIH Certification Maintenance (CM) Changes

Effective November 1, 2018

Includes current CM worksheets (cycle end-date 12/31/2018 and due by 2/1/2019)

General Process Changes

- Cycle Extensions become automatic for 6 months, once per five-year cycle, for any reason. Must submit request via email.
- 2. Consolidation of the re-activation rules for Expired and Voluntary Surrender, includes new rules and fees.
- 3. Immediate reporting of a felony conviction now required, rather than waiting until the end of the CM cycle.

Category 1 (Active Practice) Change

4. A linear CM credit formula is now used for any %IH practice 0-50%. The cap remains at 3 points per year.

Category 2 (Committees) Change

5. Local Section Committee Members now qualify for **0.5 CM** points per year.

Category 3 (Publications) Change

6. Allow 'other media' publication to count as Non-Peer Reviewed (e.g., web blogs, videos and podcasts) if outside the person's organization <u>AND</u> meets the following criteria: > 500 words in length, technical in nature, pertains to IH subject matter, and contains references. Primary author receives **0.5 CM points**.

Course #1: Flash Fire and Explosion Hazards: Identification and Control 8:30 AM – 12:00 noon

Course Instructor: Vahid Ebadat, PhD Stonehouse Process Safety

Many operations in the processing industry involve handling and processing of liquids and powders, most of which could, under process conditions be flammable. Flammable gas, vapor, and dust cloud atmospheres can be ignited if a sufficiently energetic ignition source is present. As one can imagine, flash fires and explosions can lead to catastrophic events involving fatalities, injuries, community impact, facility damage, and economic

This presentation will discuss practical measures for preventing flash fires and explosions in the processing industry and protecting against their effect including:

- Conditions for gas/vapor and dust cloud flash fires and explosions
- Applicable codes, standards, and best industry practices
- Requirements of NFPA 652 Standard on Combustible Dust, <u>2019 Edition</u>
 Electrostatic spark hazard assessment, control, and mitigation

Course #2: Are you Prepared to be an Expert Witness? 8:30 AM 12:00 noon

Course Instructor: Marc Gaffrey, Partner Hoagland, Longo, Moran, Dunst & Doukas, LLP This PDC will examine the complex aspects of translating the science and practice of industrial hygiene and other occupational health, safety and environmental disciplines from the workplace to the courtroom. Preparation of legal related court documents such as expert opinions, affidavits and depositions will be reviewed so that practicing industrial hygienists and other EHS professionals understand how their technical work may be used in legal proceedings. In addition, attendees will gain an understanding of how to prepare for and serve as an expert witness in these often complex cases. Additionally, there will be discussion of the distinction between where a professional serves as a consultant versus where he/she renders an expert opinion, and the particular privileges which exist limiting the professionals disclosure of certain thoughts and impressions.

As part of this PDC, attendees will break out into small groups to prepare to litigate a mock litigation scenario. This will be a facilitated exercise to enable participants to play the role of plaintiff, professional, employer and possibly other parties in a typical lawsuit of this nature.

Course #3; Ethical Fitness- A Method for Resolving Complex Dilemmas* 1:00 PM = 4:30 PM

Course Instructor: Nancy Orr, CIH, CSP, FAIHA

This PDC on Ethical Fitness helps participants develop an increased awareness of the ethical issues and how they arise. Participants will learn to:

- Understand the nature of personal values and their role in guiding conduct
- Apply tools and skills to analyze ethical dilemmas
- Learn to identify and resolve potential 'conflict of interest' situations
- · Make higher quality ethical decisions

Participants in this course will acquire essential skills necessary to make higher quality ethical decisions. This skill – building process begins by developing an awareness of ethical issues and how they arise.

The role of personal values and their application to decision – making is then examined. Participants practice using analytical techniques to explore right vs. wrong situations as distinct from right vs. right dilemmas, where values conflict

Explore how to resolve situations where truth conflicts with loyalty, justice and mercy; set both short-term and long-term goals, and understand self-interest conflicts with the community's interest. Finally, participants will apply several resolution approaches to dilemmas in search of "the higher right."

*This course fulfills the ABIH ethics requirement for CIH recertification maintenance credit.

AIHA Submits Comments to DOL on Power Patient Lifts Proposed Rule

Yesterday, AIHA submitted comments to DOL on their proposed rule on the expansion employment, training and apprenticeship opportunities for 16-and-17-year-olds in healthcare occupations under the Fair Labor Standards Act (Docket Number: 2018-20996 / RIN: 1235-AA22).

Through this rulemaking, DOL proposes to remove the prohibition regarding the independent operation of power-driven patient lifts by 16- and 17-year-olds from the Department's Hazardous Occupations Orders (HO) 7. AIHA is concerned that the Department provides no scientific evidence for this proposed rule. Protecting workers and patients is the first priority, standing before all others. It is possible that the technologies of power-driven patient lifts and healthcare industry work environments have improved since the 2010-2011 changes to HO 7, such that the hazards to 16- and 17-year-olds have been reduced. However, the Department has provided no evidence that this is the case, and absent a new study by NIOSH, it would be irresponsible to place young workers at greater risk in an industry with one of the highest rates of injuries based upon a handful of letters and tangential anecdotes.

For these reasons, AIHA strongly urges the Department to protect America's young healthcare workers by taking the following steps:

- Issuing a new rule that would prohibit 16- and 17-year-olds from manually lifting patients who cannot bear weight;
- Maintaining the current conditions under which 16- and 17-year-olds can operate powerdriven patient lifts under Hazardous Occupations Order 7;
- Asking NIOSH to revisit the work it conducted from 2010 to 2011, and conduct a new assessment to determine the circumstances, if any, that 16- and 17-year-olds can safely operate power-driven patient lifts, either independently or as part of a team with another employee who is at least 18 years of age.
