The guidance counselor conference attended by Dan Preisler resulted in an invitation for NJAIHA to attend the Pleasant Point career day. Candice Kowalewski, M.P.H. of ALC Environmental attended and represented NJAIHA with a presentation of a career in Industrial Hygiene. Candice used the "What is IH - High School Presentation" provided by national AIHA to discuss IH careers to an auditorium full of students and explained education requirements, monitoring equipment, respiratory protection and why she enjoys her job. Kelly discussed his new book "Moment of Truth" and how we should respond to emergency situations from an industrial hygiene, environmental, health and safety point. On the related topic of designing new facilities and reviewing existing reaction systems to ensure that they are adequately protected against the possibility of runaway reactions, Guibing Zhao, PhD, Technical Director of Dekra Process Safety Americas presented "Two-Phase Flow Pressure Relief System for Runaway Reactions".

### **CALL FOR NOMINATIONS 2019-2020**

Nominations are now being accepted for 2019-2020 NJ Local Section of AIHA (NJAIHA) Executive Committee for President-elect and Director of Publications. NJAIHA needs interested members who want to continue the legacy of the organization in order to protect worker health. **Topic:** Combustible Dust and How to Assess Dangerous Properties

Combustible dust is composed of fine and dry particles that present an explosion hazard when suspended in air in certain conditions. Dust explosions have catastrophic consequences. They may lead to loss of life, injuries, and destruction of property. If combustible dust is handled or produced in a facility, the employers are encouraged to identify the combustible dust hazards and ensure the safe operations. This presentation will provide a systematic description of the parameters involved in the combustible dust assessments, information about the sampling procedures, the analytical techniques used to measure the combustible dust parameters, and the interpretation of the data obtained from the laboratory.

Mine Safety and Health Research Advisory Committee (MSHRAC)

Matters To Be Considered: The agenda will include discussions on mining safety and health research projects and outcomes, including updates from two MSHRAC Workgroups, the Health Advisory in the Mining Program Workgroup and the Metal Mining Automation and Advanced Technologies Workgroup; industrial minerals sector research priorities; translation of hand-arm vibration to the hearing canal; ground control challenges in Nevada weak rock; respirable dust control technology; EXAMiner hazard recognition training; slips, trips and falls research; health and safety management systems through safety climate; and lithium ion battery research. ### Updates on Notable and Key Bills

### California

AB 1596: The Fentanyl or Other Illicit Drug Contaminated Property Posting Act of 2019

AIHA Position: Not Yet Established

Status: Hearing scheduled for 4/9/19

#### New York

 4948: Would establish occupational injury and disease prevention centers at the City University of New York Center for the Biology of Natural Systems and the occupational health center at the Upstate Medical University of the State University of New York.

AIHA Position: Not Yet Established

Status: (4/2) Referred to the Committee on Labor

### Oklahoma

HB 1260: Creates a revolving fund for the Department of Labor to be designated the "Department of Labor Administrative Penalty Revolving Fund". The Department of Labor shall retain up to \$30,000.00 of monies accruing to the credit of the Department of Labor Administrative Penalty Revolving Fund, derived from citations for violations of the Oklahoma Occupational Health and Safety Standards Act, per fiscal year. Said monies shall only be used in support of this act for

the production and dissemination of workplace safety educational materials, for workplace safety educational presentations and training, or for the acquisition of workplace safety equipment.

AIHA Position: Not Yet EstablishedStatus: (4/1) Sent to the Governor

### Pennsylvania

- HB 809: An Act providing for implementation of workplace violence policies and workplace violence prevention measures by employers and for civil action.
  - AIHA Position: Not Yet Established
  - Status: Judiciary Committee hearing <u>scheduled</u> for 4/8/19

### Rhode Island

- H 5828: Related to the adult use of cannabis. Would require all employees of cannabis
  establishments to participate in a comprehensive training program on workplace safety, among
  other elements. Would require the Office of Cannabis Coordination to consider whether additional
  regulations are necessary to address worker safety.
  - AIHA Position: Not Yet Established
  - Status: (4/1) Withdrawn at sponsor's request

### Washington State

- SB 5550: Would establish a pesticide safety committee. The first priority of the committee is to explore how the departments of agriculture, labor and industries, and health, and the Washington poison center collect and track data. The committee must also consider the feasibility and requirements of developing a shared database, including how the department of health could use existing tools, such as the tracking network, to better display multiagency data regarding pesticides. The committee may also evaluate and recommend policy options that would take action to, among other things: Improve pesticide application safety with agricultural applications; Lead an effort to establish baseline data for the type and quantity of pesticide applications used in Washington to be able to compare the number of exposures with overall number of applications; and Research ways to improve pesticide application communication among different members of the agricultural community, including educating the public in English and Spanish about acute and chronic health information about pesticides.

  - Status: <u>Hearing held</u> in the Labor and Workplace Standards Committee for 4/1/19; referred to the Appropriations Committee
